Notable Men in Church History

Albertus Magnus



A German Dominican friar, philosopher, and theologian, Albertus Magnus was a pivotal figure in medieval philosophy and theology. He is recognized as one of the most influential scholars of his time. Albertus was the eldest son of a wealthy German lord. After his early schooling, he went to the University of Padua, where he studied liberal arts. There he joined the Dominican order in 1223. He continued his studies at Padua and Bologna, Italy and in Germany. He taught theology at several convents throughout Germany and ended up in Cologne.

Albert's work laid the groundwork for integrating Greek philosophy, especially that of Aristotle, into Christian thought, helping to bridge the gap between reason and faith. He was known for intellectual rigor and became a mentor to Thomas Aquinas, another giant in medieval thought.

St. Albert the Great was one of the first scholars to comprehensively study and incorporate Aristotle's works, which had just been reintroduced to Western Europe through translations from Arabic, defending the idea that reason and revelation could coexist harmoniously. In his theological works, Albert supported the compatibility of reason and faith, arguing that philosophy could be used as a tool to better understand divine truth. His synthesis of Christian doctrine with Aristotelian principles influenced centuries of Christian theology.

St. Albert the Great was canonized in 1931 by Pope Pius XI and declared a Doctor of the Church. His feast day is celebrated on November 15.

Albertus's works represent the entire body of European knowledge of his time not only in theology but also in philosophy and the natural sciences. His importance for medieval science essentially consists in his bringing Aristotelianism to the fore against reactionary tendencies in contemporary theology. On the other hand, without feeling any discrepancy in it, he also gave the widest latitude to Neoplatonic speculation, which was continued by his disciple Ulrich of Strasbourg and by the German mystics of the 14th Century. It was by his writings on the natural sciences, however, that he exercised the greatest influence. Albertus must be regarded as unique in his time for having made accessible and available Aristotelian knowledge of nature and for having enriched it by his own observations in all branches of the natural sciences. A preeminent place in the history of science is accorded to him because of this achievement.

Greetings Brothers, my name is J. J. Wilder and I have the privilege of being your State Advocate for 2024-2025. I retired in Sept 2023 and moved from Tennessee to Las Vegas. As many of you are not aware of my background, our Worthy State Historian (and 2024-2025 State Warden), Michael Brady, asked me to provide some of this information.

I am a cradle Catholic born in Memphis, TN in 1951 and attended the Holy Rosary Parish Catholic grade school and Memphis Catholic High School for Boys graduating in 1969. I went on to the University of Tennessee College of Engineering and received a



Bachelor of Science degree in nuclear engineering.

My work experience started with the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA). I was fortunate to work on all their nuclear plants; three units at Browns Ferry Nuclear Plant in AL, and two units each at Sequoyah Nuclear Plant and Watts Bar Nuclear Plant in TN, as well performing engineering work on the ten units that they cancelled. After 17 years with TVA, I began work for an engineering consulting company that supported the Department of Energy nuclear facilities across the United States and in 2010 I came to work at the Nevada Test Site, the first of two assignments in Nevada. Since my assignments were not permanent, I retained my membership in the Knights of Columbus in Tennessee.

My Knights membership began in 2006 and through the years I have held the positions of Grand Knight, Faithful Navigator, and District Deputy as well as an assortment of other Council and Assembly offices and positions on parish councils. I transferred my KofC membership from St. Mary's Council 3175 in Oak Ridge, TN to Mother Seton Council 11029 in Las Vegas and I have enjoyed getting to know the members of my council and through them the larger parish community.

That is one of the more important benefits of Knights membership. The Knights are a gateway to all the Church has to offer wherever we may live. Active membership in the Knights makes us better Catholic men, husbands, fathers, and friends. I love to share these benefits with my wife, Helen, and she really enjoys participating with me at Knights events.

Speaking of Helen, we have been married for nearly 13 years. We were both previously married and obtained annulments in the church to allow our marriage in 2011. Helen is a staunch supporter of my Knights work and is willing to travel wherever we may need to go.

My name is Digna Pena. I am a member of the newly formed Stewardship Council at Christ the King in Torrey Pines, Las Vegas, NV. In 2013, I moved to Las Vegas from Albuquerque, NM after getting engaged to my husband. Soon after, we were married at Christ the King. After a short few months, my husband told me that he is a 4th degree member of the Knights of Columbus in California where he came from. I asked him if he would like to join the Knight Council at Christ the King and be active again. He said he will find out. One evening, he decided to join the meeting. He said he was not very comfortable and does not want to attend another meeting. I continued to prod him until he started joining the meeting more regularly.

He started participating in some of the activities of the Knights of Columbus such as pancake breakfast, tootsie roll drive that benefits the physically and mentally challenged children of our community. The selling of Seminarian tickets that collectively supports the Seminarian program of the Diocese. Our involvement with the activities of the Knights gave us the feeling of satisfaction in knowing that we are strengthening our faith and helping us promote a better community. This led us to get involved in other Church activities both internal as members of the encyclical and eucharistic ministries and external outreach ministries. Later, when the Ladies Auxiliary was formed, I decided to join and I become one of the founding members. I first was elected Vice-President and later President, serving four terms.

During my tenure as president, the Ladies have successfully launched fund raising campaign events such as our bake sale, the autumn interlude dinner dance, the cookbook project which is a collection of recipes contributed by our members. We named it "Flavorful Favorites". A large portion of the funds we raised from the bake sale, the sale of the cookbook and other fund raising activities was donated to the Church and whatever was left went toward the purchase of a marble statue of Mother Mary with the approval of Fr. Shawn. Working with Fr. Shawn, we were also able to have the marble mosaic picture of St. Peter, St Paul, the Holy Family which was imported from Lebanon, donated an electric fan at the community center, had signs of our Church building and much more.

It was like Mother Mary was guiding our hands every step of the way. We were getting the support of our parish community. The cost of the Marble Statue including the provisions to build a more solid foundation because of its weight; the Hail Mary prayers in five languages required a lot of money but Mother Mary showed us the way. We were able to get it done. Now we have her in the right place for our parishioners to pray and offer their petitions to her in their hours of need. This is what we have achieved by giving of our time, talent and resources which is the essence of Stewardship.

Around this time of the year I can't help but get this feeling of nostalgia remembering Christmas celebration in the Philippines. A kind of loneliness that brings me back to the time when I was a young kid busy making lanterns (Parole). The Filipinos have the longest Christmas Celebration in the World. It starts in the month of September. Kids in my block in Kamuning, Quezon City, Philippines where I grew up, are busy preparing to attend Simbang Gabi and making lanterns by hand. The process starts out by gathering some bamboo tree and chopping them up into small sticks. Binding them together to form a star. Tying the tip of the star with wires. Putting a wire around the star to keep it together. Stretching it and putting a post in the middle and securing it with wires so it won't collapse.

Now we have a star shape foundation. The next step is to select the different color thin Japanese paper that you will use to wrap the Lantern with. You get some glues and start cutting out the paper to the shape of the lantern. Then you glue the paper to the Star. After you have covered the entire area, then it is time to put some more materials that will go around the lantern and on the star itself. After you are done decorating the star with trimmings that you cut into bubbly strips to form small circles with a different color material. After that you are ready to install the light inside the

lantern. After all is done, you look at it and admire the work of art that you have created. The fun starts when you hang the lantern by the window of your house like most of your neighbors are doing. It is sort of like a contest among us kids as to who can make the most unique lantern.

In Kamuning, we go to The Sacred Heart Parish Church which is about five blocks from where we live. We don't mind the long walk and the dark street because we are usually accompanied by other friends who goes to the same church. We usually start at around 10:00 PM and attend the midnight mass. After the mass, we usually hang out at the corner of KD and K1st St. because our neighbor Mrs. Pastor usually has a couple of long tables where she serves hot tea, rice cookies (bibingka) puto seco, purple rice that is mixed with coconut juice that is placed in a bamboo and steamed until cooked. Oh it is so good especially with hot tea. Mrs. Pastor is famous for this and there is a lot of our neighbors who will eat there or order to take out. Oh how I miss those unique Christmas delicacies like puto bong bong, puto Maya, puto, kutchinta and lots lots more. Filipinos are known for their hospitality. It is not surprising to get invited to taste some of these delicacies.

You will feel Christmas all around you. The Lanterns hanging on every house windows, the ritual of Simbang Gabi, the putting together of the Belen or the Nativity set and the singing of Christmas Carols which you can hear from carolers who goes around the neighborhood to raise money. The coming of the cool winter chill that ushers in the start of the Christmas season. The smiles in the faces of people you meet in the streets. The stores decorated with different color twinkling lights. Christmas trees with wrapped presents at the foot. Stores overstocked with toys, gifts and decorations. Every kids and shoppers dreamland. Surround sound Christmas music can be heard everywhere. In the Philippines, people save up to spend on town fiestas, Christmas and New Year. I don't think nothing much has changed. The Lantern that we used to make by hand are now made of mother of pearls, the lights used to decorate the lanterns are spectacular.

At our house, my father makes it a point that before midnight, we kids should be home because there is some food prepared for us like ham, cheese ball, and fruits like oranges, grapes, apples, and nuts or different kinds. We also have coffee and tea. We eat together after saying a small prayer of thanks to the Lord and then we get ready for bed.

Christmas in Portland: An Interfaith Holiday



This year one Nevada Knight and his wife did something very unusual for Christmas: they flew to Portland, OR, to spend the Holiday with their Jewish son, Pat, and his family. Pat was born and raised Catholic, but converted to Judaism 25 years ago. He has since married a Jewish woman, Lisa, and they have a daughter, Josephine, who last year celebrated her Bat Mitzvah. Pat and his family recently bought a townhome just a three-minute walk from Multnomah Village in Portland. Multnomah Village, known for its small-town atmosphere, was first established as a train station in the early 1900's by the Oregon Electric Railway. The Railway building is one of many original buildings in the Village that are still intact.

Day one started with a breakfast of bagels, lox, cream cheese, sliced tomatoes and red onions. Then the families went to "The Grotto," the National Sanctuary of our Sorrowful Mother, a ministry of the Servite Friars, Order of Friar Servants of Mary. Located in the Madison South district of Portland, The Grotto was constructed in 1924, and covers 62 acres set both at the foot of, and atop, a 110 foot cliff. In December, the Grotto hosts a dazzling Christmas Festival of Lights that draws more than 60,000 guests each year. The two families explored the walking trails (in the rain) which were ablaze with lighted decorations. Then they heard a concert in the Chapel of Mary and visited the gift shop on their way out.

Day two saw our Knight demonstrate his breakfast-making prowess --- gained from many months of working the pancake breakfasts back at the parish. He made blueberry pancakes, scrambled eggs and turkey sausage. This was served with Portland's favorite -- "Stumptown" coffee. Then the families took in the "Beyond Van Gogh" art exhibit at the Oregon Convention Center. This 45-minute program featured 300 Van Gogh paintings projected in whole and in parts on 24-foot walls. In some cases, the paintings were animated: water rippled, flowers swayed in the breeze, and leaves blew along a path. After lunch at Shalom Y'all, a restaurant in southeast Portland's Buckman neighborhood, once described as an "Israeli street food kitchen," it was on to Powell's Books, the largest independent bookstore in America.

Day three, after breakfast, both families attend Christmas Mass at Our Lady of the Lake Catholic Church in Lake Oswego OR. The church was established in October 1890 in a building which could seat only 50 people. That building still stands today at the original site. The new church building holds several hundred people. Then it was home for a traditional Hanukkah dinner of matzo ball soup, beef brisket, green beans, home-made latkes and challah bread. Grace was said over each meal, alternately either in English ("Bless us, Oh Lord...") or in Hebrew ("Baruch ata Adonai eloheinu..."). During dinner the families listened at first to popular Christmas carols sung by Bing Crosby, Perry Como, etc.. then they heard Hanukkah songs sung (in Hebrew) by Cantor Emeritus Alan Weiner from Temple Beth Hillel of Valley Village, CA. After dinner the families exchanged presents. Our Knight's favorite gift was an ivory-colored sweatshirt, emblazoned with the name of his favorite magazine -- The New Yorker.

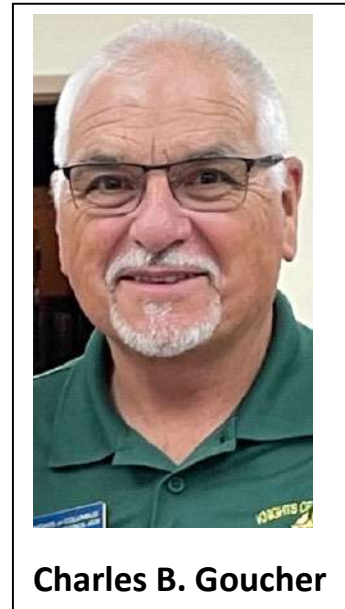
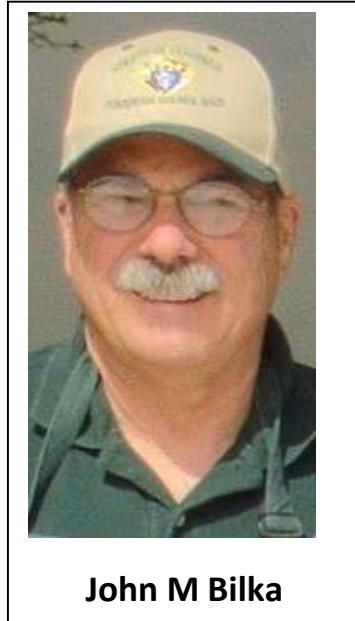
Day four saw our Knight and his wife return home to Nevada.

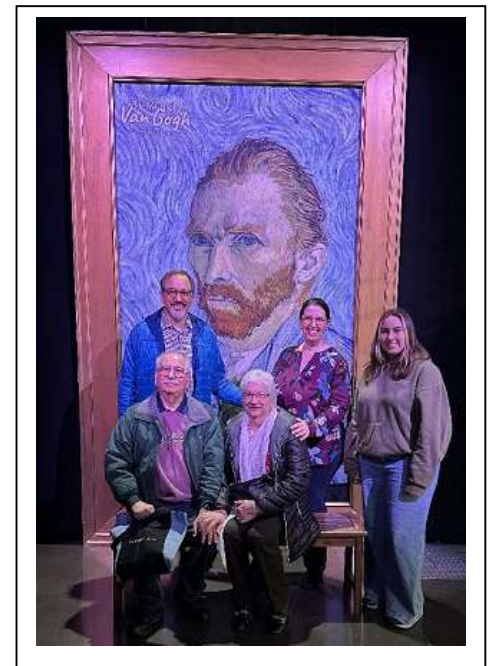
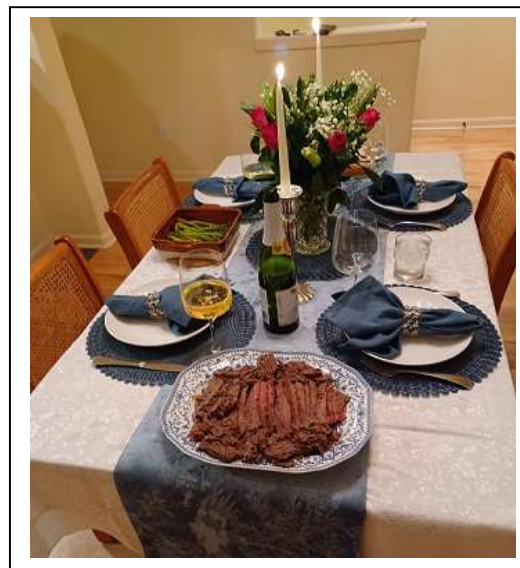
